

ALLEN Memphis Calculated X made their Mashville debut at Spanky's Sat. 9-25. For a band that no one had ever heard, they received quite a good reception. Spanky's was nearly full, and people were nonestly dancing (including Spanky's owner, Jim Settles!). This is really not surprising, considering Calculated X's style and repertoire... solid DOR 4/4 beat, flawless covers such as "Passing Strangers" by Ultravex & "I Will Follow" by U-2, & originals that leave you visibly staken & wondering how

they could ever top that...
Calculated X is (alphabetical order) Bobby Bowie, bass & lead vocals; Alan Hayes, synth; Kye Kennedy, guitar; Chuck Spencer, lead vocals & drums; & Dr. David Unsted, synth & guitar. I spoke with them between their 2nd & 3rd sets:

NIR: What is your original/cover ratio? Alam: It's about 3/4 to 1/4...1/4 original. NIR: Are there plans to include more original songs?

Chuck: Oh sure... Alan: You've got to realize that we're a new band. We're only 6 months old...we started playing out in March...and you can't expect to overwhelm people with or-

iginal material. MIR: I suppose it takes time to write songs. Chuck & Bobby: yeah...

Alan: We're playing hands that we like, & you're a product of what you listen to of course...we play what we like & it helps develop our own style.

Chuck: We've got a lot more songs in the BEKING.

NIR: Do audiences seem to take to your own somes very well after hearing your covers? Chuck: So far...

(Alan leaves the room at this point). NIR: Who writes most of your sougs?

Bobby: We all write. Chuck: It's pretty much a group effort. Bobby: Someone comes up with an idea & we all expand on it.

NIR: When you set out to write a song, is there a certain sound or style you go after? Chuck: I guess we go for the electro thing. Bobby: The basic dance beat with electronics Chuck: We want people to dance.

Bobby: We like dancing... NIR: Tell us about your name...

Bobby: X is the unknown factor...remember algebra?

(Alam returns)
Alam: X is what you're seeking for. We're trying to Calculate what might happen mext. Cauck: Calculating to the end... Bobby: We don't know what's going to happen, but we can still plan for it ... Plus it was better than "Italian Spy David:

Movie". NIR: Tell us about your forthcoming EP ... Kye: It's about this big around & it's

vinyl...

Alan: We figuranced the whole thing. What we're shooting for is to get some vinyl out as much for promotion as anything. We'd like to be picked up by a smaller label like IRS or Rough Trade; we're going to send out a lot of records and hope we do pretty good... Chuck: It is a 12". Alan: We've had a lot better crowd than we

were expecting ... a local radio station really screwed us over ...

for space reasons I can't recount entirely mere. Suffice to say that RVU was sent a promo copy of their record & promised them am on-the-air interview. The record was lost & the interview never materialized.) NIR: What kind of reaction do you get being a synthesizer band in a hardcore world of guitars?

Alan: I think people are glad to see a change, they we been hearing these power chords for

so long... Kye: Synthesizers can be twice as powerful se guitars. Alan can do things that are almost scary of his synthesizers...very ethereal....I'm getting into guitar synthesis which is kind of a......synthesis.... NIR: Why don't you use rhythm machines &

sequencers onstage? Chuck: It's a human factor really. Alan: playing live, he (Chuck) can't hear them loud enough to stay on beat... David: To hear theme they'd have to over-

power everything else. NIR: Closing comments? Kye: Our "message" is positive...it's a

good time. Alan: If those people get out there and have fun, then we have twice as good of time.

FINISH

New bands come and new bands go. never make it into the clubs, and those that do find it to be a long hard climb from opening to headlining status. Practical Stylist is one new band whose dedication and work seems to finally be paying off; the band played its first headlining gig recently, and plans to begin recording and touring the South soon. Consisting of Scott Sullivant(bass, vocals) Jim Hodgekins(drums), and David Russell(guitar) Practical Stylist is definately one of Nashville's hottest new groups, having been together only five months. This tight trio plays very danceable pop music reminiscent of the early Jam, not in terms of sound, but in its energy, freshness, and enthusiasm. NIR spoke with Practical Stylist prior to their headline debut, and here's what was said: NIR: Where'd the name of the band come from?

It came from an English book I had in freshman English in college; it was a book on how to write themes. I liked the name because I think it fits the style of our music and pretty well describes what we are, practical stylists...we don't want to go out on a limb and do anything we don't want to just to please people; we want to please ourselves first.

NIR: How would you catagorize your music? We were labeled "power pop", not by us but by other people, and I don't mind that. We blend a lot of styles really: Scott: Being catagorized is not really fair a lot of times...

David: Open up a new catagory... Scott: We just write the music and come up with it the best we can. Whoever likes it,

that's fine with us. NIR: What are your influences? You've been compared to the Jam by a lot of people... Scott: We have such a wide range of influences. That may be what we can attribute our style to ...a little on the edge of everything. I like

the Jam a lot; I like XTC... David: Soundwise, it probably sounds like the Jam because of the instrumentation, but the songs aren't really like the Jam's.

Scott: There are lots of things I get ideas from listening to. A lot of people say we sound like the Jam, but we try to keep away

from sounding like that. When somebody walks up and sees a three piece, being the kind of style that we are, it takes a little extra effort to get it over to the people that we're not trying to be the Police or the Jam or somebody similar like that.

Why do you think that some nights you're able to get the audience excited and dancing while other nights they just sit there? Scott: I pretty much feel that around this area there's not a band like us, our particular style, and at first people weren't sure whether it was cool to like us or not. That's the easiest way to sum it up. I think it took them a few times to figure out why and if they liked it. I think we've gotten over that barrier. The last couple of gigs we've played, the audience reaction has been real good ... Nashville really likes to dance. Jim: But no one likes to be the first one up. Scott: Our music's pretty danceable, and once they decided whether they liked us or disliked us, and now that they've seen us enough, they know what to expect out of us, so it's easier on the crowd.

NIR: What do you think of the Nashville "scene" in general?
Scott: I think it's a shame that there's only

two clubs in Nashville where new bands can play. I really believe that if there were more clubs around there would be more of a scene, because a lot of bands don't want to become associated with just one club so they stretch appearences out over a long period of time. Most of the headline acts in town play once every 4-6 weeks and the rest of the time it's either out-oftown bands or new groups, and I don't know if I should say this, but Nashville really doesn't like to take chances. It's a good scene when everybody tries.

Jim: On the optomistic side, it's good that people can come and do whatever they want to and have a good time. It could be worse.. NIR: Any recording plans?


Scott: We're fixing to start working on a recording project in late October with Andy Byrd producing it, and we're real excited about that. We don't know exactly what it's going to go to: single, EP, or whatever, but there's going to be some vinyl out before the year's end.

What about out-of-town dates? Scott: We haven't had any yet. We have tentative plans to play Athens, Atlanta, Knoxville, Louisville, and Memphis. Right now working on some tapes to send to clubs. Jim: It's still a pretty new experience for all of us 'cause we've only played 5 or 6 times and haven't headlined. We're covering a lot of ground pretty quickly. Scott: It's going to be a busy couple of

months. We'll do a lot of making or breaking. NIR: Any closing remarks? David: Come see us play...

Scott: ...and have a good time. -ANDY





CHEAP TRICK is spending a couple of weeks here before they start work on a new album.

# TALK TALK TALK TALK

WHEN I first mentioned to a local band member that they might consider rescheduling their gig for Thursday 9/16 because the TALKING HEADS would be at Vanderbilt, laughter and disbelief spread across his face. I suppose the Heads in Nashville seemed unbelievable. But sure enough just as soon as we had finished doing the Stray Cat strut, the Heads rolled into town and put on a fabulously exciting and intriguing

show at VU's Memorial Gym.

The original band, lead vocalist David Bryne, bassist Tina Weymouth, drummer Chris Frantz and keyboardist Jerry Harrison had sort of been out of synch with each other for the past year pursuing individual talents. The separation resulted in three solo albums (Frantz and wife Weymouth formed the Tom Tom Club). The band had recently rejoined forces and hit Nashville as part of their extensive "The Name of This Band is..." 82 Tour, their first in almost two years. The time and separation effects seemed to have only strengthened the group as a whole. The Heads played together as a unit pounding out intricately layered and rnythmically flowing compositions and yet very apparent was the feeling of each musicians individuality. A band view revealed high energy and talent, but the closer view of each Head showed the electricity flowing between

the musician to the instrument to the audience and back to the musician. Each

Head's bundle of energy produced an over-

whelming effect of group energy.

The famed NY band who had emerged from the underground music scene of the mid-70's appeared on stage with the expanded version (4 additional members for this show) which has been their style since their 1980 tour. The "mixed" crowd was psyched and anxious for the Heads and gave a warm welcome to the opening band, locals Jason and the Nasn-ville Scorchers. Despite an apparent sound system sabotage, J+ NS further energized the crowd. The atmosphere set, the Heads opened with the power of "Psycho Killer" and continued the funky African polyrhythmic dance beat throughout the snow with no attempt to recapture the original simplistic sound from the early years. And the material performed corresponded to their current style with the majority of the focus on their most recent works.

On stage the Talking Heads were not just another "great snow". They proved that they're not solely a vinyl band. They are talent and energy in action. They're

intelligent musicians giving an inspired and inspiring performance. And they're intelligent musicains having a fantastic time playing for an audience. Bryne gave us a stunning gyrating dance snow including the famed far eastern hand slicing segment during "Once in a Lifetime". A slow and effective backbend to the floor and 6 laps round the stage (looked like he might have trained with Mick) were all part of his physical involvement with the music. Bryne, dressed in 1930's style(tailored baggy grey slacks and a starched white shirt buttoned to the neck) captured most of the attention on stage, second only to the lead female vocalist, Dolette, Adding to the performance were very mood setting lighting effects which at one point cast eerie shadows of the band onto a black backdrop. The double encore show was a fulfilling night of dance and intrigue and we may ask ourselves now did it come to be? Thus, a note of thanks to Vanderbilt Concerts for booking an act that might have otherwise passed over and not through Nashville. It was good to see everyone appreciating and enjoying, once again, a national band. Including our unbelieving local band member

# ED FIZERID

"I just decided not to perform anymore until I had a full time band."

Ed Fitzgerald is explaining his six month absence from the Nashville live music scene--which began, oddly enough, shortly after the release of his debut record. Fitzgerald and his wife, Judy, had been playing around town with various musicians since late 1975. The pair went into the studio with one band lineup in May, 1981 to cut demo tapes for a possible record deal. One result was the five song "Ed Fitzgerald-Civic Duty" EP.

"We just decided to cut some more tracks and make it into a record ourselves", says Fitzgerald. "We figured it would be an easier promotional tool for us to use, as opposed to just trying to push tapes to people. We thought we could maybe get some airplay, maybe sell some records, maybe support some live dates."

Did it work?

"the psychological impact's a lot greater when you hand someone a disc, than when you give them tapes. Your concept is then a reality, which they can compare to whatever other records they we seen or heard."

HINCKIEX AND THE JUNIORS

The musicianship and production on the EP are both excellent, but the same may be said of a lot of other homegrown releases. What separates this record from most of the others is the songs themselves. Though his music is not overly commercial, Ed Fitzgerald definitely has an ear for a hook. After only a few listens, the melodies from the EP (especially "Dark Stars" and "Eden") were floating through my head long after the record had stopped playing.

Ed Fitzgerald and Civic Duty played two live dates shortly after the EP was released last February. (the band's only live gigs since entering the studio the previous May). After six months off to write new material and get a permanent band together, the ne lineup debuted at Cantrell's not long ago. Civic Duty now features Dale Brown on bass (formerly of The Hots), brother Mark

Brown on guitar, Ohio native Phil Schettler on drums, Judy Fitzgerald on vocals, and Ed on vocals and guitar. The new band "is more involved emotionally, whereas the session people I worked with were more involved technically," says Fitzgerald.

The new Ed Fitzgerald and Civic Duty looked and sounded great at their first gig, performing all the EP material and a half dozen new songs which are easily as strong as those on the record. "Long way to Heaven" even sounds like a possible single (with a great vocal by Judy Fitzgerald). The band has no definite plans to release another record in the near future, though, so fans will have to settle for live performances and the EP for now. If you haven't heard either, you owe it to yourself to check it out. With a little luck and a hoped-for record deal, Ed Fitzgerald and Civic Duty may not be playing the local clubs for long.

# OUT OF THE CRADLE ENDLESSLY ROCKING

If the Mashville new music scene has a most valuable player it.'s got to be Jack Emerson. A Vanderbilt senior, Jack Emerson is PRAXIS Records, Mashville's only new music record label. The label boasts three excellent releases: OUR FAVORITE BAND'S EP. The NEVER IN MASHVILLE compilation, and JASON AND THE MASHVILLE SCOROHER'S RECKLESS COUNTRY SOUL EP. All have received braise from critics across the country and have sold well. Jack was one of the original Scorchers(on bass) and has been responsible for a good deal of the band's success in becoming a ton regional act. Jack is busy, busy, busy, but he always is more than eager to talk to anyone interested in what he has to say. MIR is proud to present the following in depth interview with Jack Emerson.

NIR: What's PRAXIS Records up to these days? JACK: I'm going to school; I'm working with the Scorchers. We're recording an album in Memphis with Ken Dickerson who, among other things, has produced Alex Chilton and Big Star. I don't know if you've heard of Big Star, they're a real cult level band from Memphis. They're one of my favorites. Ken played with the Stones during the early 70's and went on a couple of tours with them, playing keyboards. He's produced Ry Coder. had a solo album out in '71, one of my favorite of all times, it s almost hold of, you can't find it anywhere. He gave me one or I wouldn't even have one.

We're going to go to Memphis and record. Initially we hope to record in one time block in Sam Phillips' studio and probably mix it. somewhere else. The Cramps did their album there. We'll be able to go in and have certain time blocks out for us, and if things are going well we'll be able to stay. I like the idea of going to Memphis to record in that if things are going right and everyone seems to be clicking, we can work all night. We'll probably end up doing two or three different sets, though, because they(the Scorchers) need to go out on the road to make some money; it's now they survive. It's only a three nour

drive, so we'll probably be going over there 2 or 3 or 4 times and putting down what we have and what we think is the best. Jason's been writting lots of songs lately, whereas when I was playing in the band we only had two original songs. Now there's close to ten, although they don't play them all all the time. We're going to try to concentrate on Jason's originals. It won't sound as live as the EP. We're going to try to get a good live feel, but technically there'll be some overdubs. It'll be minimal though; it won't be a really highly produced album. We'll just have more time to spend with it and see what happens.

Our Favorite Eand's going to put an album out. It was originally going to be a 12" EP, but for the cost involved it s not that much more expensive to go ahead and put out an album. It'll probably be more of a project which will involve several different Kemphis musicians, one of which. Ross Johnson, has played drums with Alex Chilton at several different times and played with Panther Surns.

Con, who's the guitar player and basically writes most of the music lives in Memphis now, and Morey, the singer, lives in Eaton Rouge. They've only played live six times. The whole idea behind the band is to play whenever they get together; there's no

definate members. It can be anybody they decide to bring in on a drunken afternoon to play. The thing they like about it, and I like about it, is if it doesn't go quite the way they want it, it's no big deal. It's not like you've spent \$1000 on studio time for a day, and it ill show in that the tracks will be real loose and the same thing that the Cramp's or Gun Club's first albums were. It 'll be in t in that they're not interested in touring or anything like that ... It'll be a real studio project. We got extremely good reviews on the last one which really suprised me. I loved the record, but I didn't think anyone would like it except for about 25 critics or so, but it sold well. We sold about 1200 comies and got good airplay on both coasts.

I'm working on a couple of other projects, but nothing I can really talk about. I've been listening to a lot of demos; I've been getting demos from all over the place. I've been looking at a lot of really talented solo artists, but it's so difficult to really put enything out on an independent label unless a

band is attempting to establish themselves on the road. I don't see now anyone can expect to sell a massive amount of copies, say 3 or 4 thousand, without really serious road work unless it s some kind of novelty song. MIR: Will Jason's album be on Praxis or some other label?


JACK: It all depends really. If someone made us a really good offer we'd probably go for it. We feel like most labels won't understand what Jason and the Scorchers and myself are trying to get across. Of course it's an image, cause you can't get away from an image, but as far as Jason is concerned, everyone in the band is who they are. It's four distinct personalities there's obviously conflicts when you get four fairly headstrong people. There's always rumours that somebody's going to quit or some-thing's going to happen, but that's just some-thing you've got to live with. The who have been on the verge of breaking up since day one.

As for putting it out on Praxis, I think it'll probably end up being on Praxis; we would like to get some major distribution of course. It's a hard question to enswer. We're definately not going to sign on some label that doesn't understand what we're doing or what we're attempting to do and aren't going to be supportive. We conit want to be 42 on some record lacel's list. If we're not convinced

that they're entheusiastic about the band or are willing to make certain artistic concessions then we probably wouldn't. I think we could do well in England and Europe, like the Stray Cats had to go to England to get some acceptance. I'll be talking to some labels over there about possibly putting it out like that. A lot just depends on how it comes out and what kind of feeling we get from the labels. We've already got major label inter from three or four different labels, but it gets pretty heary when you start talking about something like that.

I think R.E.M. is a very good example to follow as for as someone who put their single out and got very good reviews and diin't just jump on the first thing. R.E.M. is a perfect example of someone who's done what we're trying to do. They established themselves live, on the road, perfected their songs, and have just gotten tighter and tighter. The Scorchers have been together only 8 months now, and I hope eventually we'll have many labels comming up to us and giving us good deals, but until that

BARKING DOG from Memphis was in town for a gig at Spankys on 9/24 with Mourning After as the opening band. Even though the attendance wasn't at the usual all time high. (Go-Go's and Flock of Seagulls were doing it down in Atlanta's Fox) a high level of energy was emitted from the stage all night. BD made it's debut in Nashville at Cantrells in mid- August with a very impressive and danceable sound. The September show proved that BD continues to be one of the more talented acts around. And a band interview afterward proved that they have other talents too. The guys are seriously great and it was a pleasure for this NIR staffer to chat

BD believe strongly in the message of their music blasting it out in a happy and fun style. The three original members, lead singer Davis McCain, Deck Reeks on bass and Robert Bruce for the drums started the band just two years ago. The band first formed when Davis, dissatisfied with the band he was with at the time, insisted that his roommate at MSU (who happened to be Deck) buy and learn how to play a bass guitar so they could form a decent band. One "crappy bass" and one good bass later and Deck was set. All have college degrees ranging between film, communications and music. is currently in grad school) Keyboardist Keith Tomes, the newest member, joined the band last year. They cite as their main influences Joy Division, Elvis Costello, Pylon, Al Green and their good friends REM. In fact the influence goes both ways. Davis told us about the time he was performing REM's Sitting Still improvising what he thought might be the lyrics (a task we all must attempt at each hearing). Afterward, Michael preferred the Davis version so much that occasionally he croons them instead.

Barking Dog plays tight modern wave pop with a B-52 style keyboard sound, a danceable beat and a thumping bass. The vocals are melodic and yet strongly chanting. Their material is fresh, original and wellexecuted. They do a great cover of Al Green's "Take Me to the River", their Beach Music" sounds very Specials influenced and "Music to Dance to" emulates the message of their danceable style. On stage keyboardist Keith gets carried into flight by the energy circulating between him and a few selected chords he strikes out. Davis and Deck appear to have some sort of inside joke going on up on stage. (I remember from Cantrells that these were the guys who laughed a lot) Deck

says no joke. "Most of the time we laugh whenever we fuck up" By the sound of the snow I hope they keep it going. And thankfully they intend to. Deck and Davis contend that their main interest is in playing regionally because "with live music we feel we are artistically at our best."

Since their founding they have played Pogos and the Antenna in their nome turf, Athen's 40 Watt and Atlanta's T.V. Dinner and 688 Club. A Cantrells date in November was mentioned. It is well worth your time to catch them when they return. BD is also barking up the rubber tree. In about 2 months they plan to release a self produced 4 song EP. Watch for Barking Dog. So....here I am in KNOX-VILLLE; and it not been a by-way in transit from south to north on the U-FLAP-UM airlines flight TNIR booked me on, I would have never seen this civilizationforsaken burgh. But, as it happened, here and so is the great, wonderful, Tenmessee World's Fair. ith all the hype that this affair has received, one would expect more for his money than the might be found in copious quantaties scant scant 3 1/2 miles of retorical energy rhetoric found here presented. To add insult to injury, most of the exibits sported lines of people waiting their turn to enter and see whose waits exceeded their show lengths. The most glaring example of this is the China exibit whose wait exceeds its show by a factor of 20 to 30.

Comparatively, however, I personally think the fair is one better cheap thrill in the Southeast this summer. Admission is only \$9.90 for all day or \$5 for the evening. This includes all exibits and shows. The Sun Sphere (2.0), the sky rides (.75 ea) and miday rides (all overpriced) being notable exceptions.

The food varys in cost and fluctuates by time in some cases. e had an excellant Korean lunch for 2 for under \$20. (we skipped the cocktails at \$2.50). The Hungarian restraunt offered one of the netter values of the fair with cold cut hoagies. While a bit skimpy, they were cheap (\$1.00) and filling. The best by far food value at the fair is the " eer war" high has brought the price of a 140z cun to \$1 or less. In a place where 12oz cokes cost \$.75 and sno-cones are \$1.0, cheap beer was a welcome relief.

ust keep in mind that there are some real rip-offs as well as some real barains. ost restraunts have menus posted outside which also announce any specials (the Barvarian Waffle place had the \$1 Budweiser). Shopping around can save you lots of money at the fair.

Speaking of cheap souvineers, look outside the fair for the best buys in everything from mugs to Bye- ye Sticks

(The Official Garment Hanging Rod of the 1982 orld a tair). A lot of mom and pop say station; are donna get stuck with yelds of plack colt paintings of the Last Supper of our lord and mentor ELVIS with the world's Fair logo enblazoned across the holy Ripple. In other words...get the cheap stuff in the cheap places; not from the street vendors.

The lodging situation is getting a bit better for weary Trashvillians looking for a place to lay their heads. One glaring example is the park hotel. Only two blocks from the fair, inexpensive, usually vacant and offering hot and cold running roaches. Most of the major chains are booked well in advance although I found the UTK Sheraton had a double available for only \$69 per night. Wy suggestion is to get a handful of dimes and to start calling the down-

town hotel listings. While a game of random chance (my favorite kind), this offers the best bet for inexpensive lodging close to the Fair

In closing, I'd like to suggest that the best parking is free parking; which? near the river (stadium) if you arrive before 9:30 am.

happens I'm sure the band would much rather put it out on Praxis with someone who cares about it and does forceful promotion, than to put it out with some company where we're last on the long list of this year's next big thing. IIR: Why did you start Praxis?

JACK: I started Praxis because my friends in Cur Favorite Eand were interested in putting out a record... They were living in Louisiana at the time and asked me to investigate how to put a record out, and I just did it and put it out on Prexis. Prexis is "to do" if you

look it up in the dictionary. Praxis is action as opposed to theory...
What really nappened was that I was talking to Jake Riveria who manages Elvis Costello. and we had several conversations. I was one of those whining punks or whatever, and he basically said "Quit whining and do something about it", which is what you've done. You started a paper and I started a label. Riveria was kind of an inspiration to me, although he's got a reputation for being Kr. Asshole of America. We got along tremendously well after our innital arguement; I think maybe he tests people when he first meets them to find out if they've got the guts to orgue with him, which I did, and we got along real well after that.

Then a few months later, Cur Favorite Eand came to me, and we put that record out. Then I did the <u>Never In Nashville</u> 4-song EP which we learned a lot doing, and then Jeson's thing. The reason I haven't done anything lately is that, because there's loads of records that come out on independent labels and don't do snything, I feel if you're going to put a record out, you might as well take the time to send it out to 500 different radio stations and 100 different magazines and make sure that it does comething. If I'm going to put a record out, I'm going to do it all the way, not just go halfway and put the record out. IIR: are you going to continue in the music business when you graduate?

JACK: If I graduate, I see myself in the music business for the rest of my life. I've helped

out at Vanderbilt Concerts; I did promotion one year there; I've worked at CBS records; I've been in bands; I've recorded myself in the studio; I've tried to get every aspect I can so I can see it from everyone think that's one of the problems bands and labels run into. There are certain inherent problems you'll never know about until you've been there... I hope to finish school and continue working with the Scorchers. I'm absolutely convinced the Scorchers are going to make it. I sincerely believe that R.E.M. and the Scorchers are the two best bands to come out of the South in five or ten years, and I'm totally behind both of those bands. I hope to continue my music business career intil it gets boring or I feel like I can't keep my integrity.


